Why should I consider a College Transfer Program?

What can I do with a Athletic Training associate degree?

Athletic trainers help prevent and treat injuries for people of all ages. Their clients include everyone from professional athletes to industrial workers. Athletic trainers are one of the first health care providers on the scene when injuries occur. They must be able to recognize, evaluate, and assess injuries and provide immediate care when needed. They are also involved in the rehabilitation and conditioning of injuries. A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university is required for all jobs as an athletic trainer. Many states also require certification as an athletic trainer.

This program is designed to prepare students to transfer into bachelor programs. Employment of athletic trainers is expected to grow 24 percent from 2006 to 2016. Job growth will be concentrated in the health care industry, including hospitals and offices of health practitioners (Occupational Outlook Handbook).
