What can I do with an Associate degree in the field of Physical Therapy?

Originally developed as a treatment for wounded soldiers in World War I, physical therapy is one of the fastest-growing professions in the United States. Physical therapists team up with doctors and counselors in order to rehabilitate patients with physical injuries, diseases, limitations, and impairments. They develop exercise schedules and frequently use heat, cold, electricity, sound, and water technologies to relieve pain and stimulate muscles. Most commonly, physical therapists focus on rehabilitation stemming from injuries, but they may also specialize in sports therapy, orthopedics, or pediatrics.

Physical therapy programs are offered at the graduate level, meaning that students generally cannot enroll without a bachelor's degree. It is common for students to complete three years of an undergraduate program in exercise science, physical sciences, or a related field before matriculating to a physical therapy program. Admission to such programs is competitive.
