What can I do with a Sports Marketing and Management associate degree?

Education and training requirements for athletes, coaches, umpires, and related workers vary greatly by the level and type of sport. These jobs require overall knowledge of the game. Some job titles include broadcasters, news analysts, reporters and correspondents, coaches, sport instructors, professional scouts, and team officials. News analysts, reporters, and correspondents gather information, prepare stories, and make broadcasts to inform the general public.

Many coaches and sport instructors are employed in colleges and universities, amusement and recreation facilities, fitness and recreational sport centers, and elementary and secondary schools.

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
