On March 7, 2013, President Obama signed the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA), which, among other provisions, amended section 485(f) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA), otherwise known as the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act). The Clery Act requires institutions of higher education to comply with certain campus safety- and security related requirements as a condition of participating in the Federal student financial aid programs authorized by Title IV of the HEA. Notably, VAWA amended the Clery Act to require institutions to compile statistics for incidents of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking and to include certain policies, procedures and programs pertaining to these incidents in the annual security reports (ASRs).

The HEA defines the new crime categories of domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking in accordance with section 40002(a) of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 as follows:

“Domestic violence” means a “felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:

- A current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim,
- A person with whom the victim shares a child in common,
- A person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse of intimate partner
- A person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies [under VAWA], or
- Any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person’s acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.”

“Dating violence” means “violence committed by a person:

- Who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and
- Where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
 - The length of the relationship;
 - The type of relationship; and
 - The frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.”

“Stalking” means “engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:

- Fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or
- Suffer substantial emotional distress.”

There were no arrests or convictions related to domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking in 2016.

As stated in the Ancilla College catalog, students who believe they have been the object of discrimination or harassment should inform the Director of Student Development. Until such time as final regulations for VAWA are published, students who believe they have been subject to incidents of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking are encouraged to follow this same procedure. Based on individual circumstances, direct notification by the student to other appropriate Ancilla College faculty and staff, or notification to the College from local law enforcement agencies, will also serve as notice of the reported incident.

As stated in the Ancilla College faculty and staff handbooks, faculty and staff who believe they have been the object of discrimination or harassment should inform the President, or the Dean or the Director of Student Development. Until such time as final regulations for VAWA are published, faculty and staff who believe they have been subject to incidents of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking are encouraged to follow this same procedure. Based on individual circumstances, direct notification by the faculty or staff member to other appropriate Ancilla College faculty or staff, or notification to the College from local law enforcement agencies, will also serve as notice of the reported incident.
